Florence Shelor, *Habitual Servant*



People are creatures of habit. We love the familiar — the routine, the well-known friendly face, the comfortable patterns. The beloved routines of many members of Black Mountain Presbyterian Church include caring for others. Florence Shelor's

habit of service demonstrates how to live Christ's work in the world.

A well-known face at BMPC, Florence has served both the church and the wider community in Black Mountain for more than four decades. She is recognized and appreciated for her leadership in the Women's Bible Studies and the Becomers adult church school class. She has also served on Presbytery committees and helped with Logos and countless other programs.

Having spent her professional career in state social services, she has always been well aware of the needs of the community at large, and so when Swannanoa Valley Christian Ministries was founded, Florence was part of the organization. For the past six years, Florence has served on the SVCM board and is presently the president of the board.

Florence credits much of the success of SVCM to Renae Brame's leadership and to the many volunteers from the community. She observes that there is always a need for more volunteers. Rather than emphasizing her work, Florence mentions the many contributions made by others, particularly the scholarship program fostered by John Moore. Her comments reemphasize what her own actions show: that service is a way of life and each of us has a part in caring for the community.

Developing the mission habit is even more important now in the face of proposed funding cuts affecting SVCM and all social services directly. Florence explains that besides support for the food insecure, SVCM also has been able to supplement costs for heating and electricity with the help of government subsidies which are in endangered by cuts. Other money comes from donations and grants, including a grant that helps with prescription costs. Florence explains that Manna food bank provides food for the shelves at a nominal cost, and SVCM relies on the generosity of the community through donations of both money and food.

Because SVCM provides a direct means to serve those in the greatest need, involvement through donations of money, food, time, and prayers puts each of us in contact with its vital work in the community. Florence offers her time, her experience, and her commitment to doing what God expects of us. We are fortunate to experience a culture where we and our children live with those who are regular reminders of the best result of being creatures of habit, the habit of creation.
